## Snapping, the old-fashioned way

THOSE who don't own a digital camera could be accused of living in the past.

But Georgina Campbell says there's a revival of "old-school" photography under way.

Ms Campbell's photos, with some by other talented artists, will be included in the exhibition *Capture* this month at Hawthorn's Town Hall Gallery.

The Glen Iris resident said the exhibition would showcase a variety of photogra-

phy, including plastic photography – using older style, plastic-lens cameras instead of modern glass lenses.

"They're really crappy cameras, sometimes called toy cameras, or really just old-fashioned ones. There's a whole kind of movement of people doing it (plastic photography)," she said.

Ms Campbell said her seven pictures, including flowers, skulls and furniture as subject matter, were dark, spooky and moody.

Although she is a fan of plastic photography, Ms Campbell said her exhibition pictures were captured using a flatbed scanner. "I've been using scanners for the past eight years," the 29-year-old said, unwilling to divulge how scan photography worked.

*Capture* will run from January 16 to February 2 at the Town Hall Gallery, rear of 358 Burwood Rd, Hawthorn.
